Subject: Exporting Liquefied Natural Gas

To whom it may concern:

It has come to my attention that Liquefied Natural Gas Export Terminal Permits have been requested from the industry. I am opposed to exporting LNG for a multitude of reasons. The first and foremost is that the main talking point for extracting natural gas is to relieve our dependence on foreign oil. How do we do this if we're selling it outside the country?

Also, the pipelines that were built to take the gas from the current import terminals to the end users in the U.S. were built where ever the gas companies wanted them irrespective of property rights - with the use of eminent domain. Eminent domain is only granted for the purpose of the public good - not for the financial benefit of private industry. Therefore, it should be illegal to use those pipelines to transmit gas from the fields to the terminal for export - which benefits only the industry.
